Ted was born in Jerico Springs, Missouri, oldest of three sons of William Arthur and Melinda Margaret (Nebelsick) Lawrence. Melba was the youngest daughter of Arthur LeRoy and Addie Alice (Lewis) Hildreth. Melba graduated from Ankeny H.S. in 1933 and attended Ankeny Jr. College.

Ted and Melba spent their summers with family and friends on Lake Washburn near Outing, MN. In 1966 they spent their first winter vacation in southern Texas and in 1979 settled in Wagon City in Mission, TX for their winter home. In 2003, Ted and Melba made Texas their full time home.

Ted and Melba's lives were testaments of love for each other and family. In many ways, they lived the American dream of finding love, working hard, raising a family, and living happy ever after. They were dedicated to helping

their families, being a good neighbor and asked no favor in return. They celebrated 76 years love for each other in this life before Ted passed away. They are now united in eternal love.
